FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

Are you happy? I mean, are you really happy? Are you at peace?

With the state that the world is in at the moment, with so much violence and uncertainty around it can be very easy to have our peace and indeed, our happiness disturbed. So many people today are searching for answers and trying to make sense of our rapidly changing world that they look for solutions in all sorts of places and are ultimately and inevitably left disappointed and empty. You only have to look at the recent Eurovision song contest, allegedly a celebration of peace, love and the brotherhood of man, to gain an insight into the modern secular psyche. This was best expressed by the disgraceful and openly satanic act offered by Ireland, that once great land of scholars and Saints, being cheered on by the crowds, celebrating everything that is evil, ugly and sad. No wonder rates of depression and anxiety are at such all times highs if our light entrainment that is meant to distract us from the pressures and difficulties of modern life is a screaming witch setting fire to pentagrams. Poor girl.

The trouble is, that so many of us chase after what we think will bring us happiness, and what we fail to realises is that not only are we climbing up the wrong ladder, we have actually placed it against the wrong wall all together. Of course, we all like to be happy, its a nice feeling, but it's very shallow and always fleeting. As Christians what were are called to is something far more profound, a peace that the world cannot give and that is a life of joy. Happiness is a puddle that quickly dries up when difficulty and tragedy strike, compared to the deep ocean of joy that Jesus offers to us if we take the plunge and decide to follow Him, cross and all.

That is what the Christian life boils down to, it's a choice, a radical decision to follow the Lord wherever He may lead and place our hope and confidence in Him alone. We are supposed to like 'choice' these days, we all like to have as many options available to us as possible in all areas of life. And yet, we so often avoid making choices. People avoid getting married, fewer and fewer consider the priesthood, people avoid long term contracts and always look for the option to 'cancel anytime'. Making a choice nowadays is perceived as limiting our freedom - the ultimate modern heresy. If we fail to ever make a decision or a choice, however, we fail to ever live at all.

So many avoid making the choice for Jesus and conjure up all sorts of excuses as to why they can not follow Him, because they fear that this choice will lead to a life of curtailed freedom and guilt. We know, of course, that the opposite is true. The great irony is, that in this ever increasingly secular world, it is guilt that reigns supreme. We feel guilty for not having the best job, we feel guilty about not giving the kids a holiday as good as their friends had, we feel guilty because we are too fat or too ugly or not big enough, we feel guilty for not being as popular as the next person. Etc... The secular world is run on and feeds off of guilt.

The only one who can bring us true freedom and concretely set us free of our guilt and shame, is the Lord Jesus Christ. Meaningful and lasting Joy is found the knowledge that each of us is of infinite value to God and is deeply and eternally loved by Him. That love in which He holds us is the key to our eternal destiny. Amid the passing difficulties and tragedies of this fallen world we have a hope that can never be extinguished. Hope, remember, is not optimism. Optimism is thinking that things will turn out okay. True hope is the confident expectation in what God has promised and its strength is in His faithfulness.

Unless we make the choice for Jesus, we maybe momentarily happy but joy will elude us forever.
