FROM YOUR PARISH PREIST

You probably noticed that in last week's guest edition - 'From your Bishop' - that in his letter regarding the Holy Year of Jubilee 2025, His Lordship wrote that he will be coming to St Mary's next year to say Mass and to impart to those present 'the Papal Blessing with the ascribed plenary indulgence'. Some of you may be wondering what this means and so perhaps this is a good opportunity to say a few words about what an indulgence actually is. This ancient practice of the Church is much misunderstood, primarily due to hundreds of years of protestant propaganda, or "misinformation" as I believe they call it these days. An indulgence is a spiritual gift that results in the remission of the temporal punishment due, to sin that has already been forgiven. Okay... what does that mean? Basically, indulgences are all about forgiveness and wiping away the consequences of sin.

There are two kinds of punishment attached to sin, eternal and temporal. If the sin is mortal (serious, grave) sin, we lose the friendship of God and with it the life of divine grace within. If we are not restored to grace before death by means of confession of mortal sin, our separation from God is eternal. It was to repair this kind of sin that Jesus became man and was crucified. As God His, sacrifice was infinitely meritorious, as Man He was able to represent us. Thus He could atone for our mortal sins, which are not just beyond our power of reparation, but infinitely beyond it.

Venial (less serious) sin, which has no 'eternal' punishment attached to it, also disturbs the right order within us and in the order of justice in general. We all experience these temporal (worldly) consequences of sin, both personally and socially. Sin changes us and like a pebble in a pond these changes have ripple effects beyond us. Not only must we be sorry for our sins, but we must be more thoroughly converted to the Lord, and demonstrate that conversion by our actions. So, while absolution in confession forgives the eternal *guilt* of sin, it does not necessarily remove all the *consequences* of it. For that which it does not repair, we must offer restitution through prayer, penance etc., or after death by being purified in purgatory.

What an Indulgence does is to take an occasion (a certain prayer, a penance, a charitable work or in our case a special occasion such as the Jubilee Year) and add to it the merits of Jesus Christ. This can either partially, or under certain conditions, totally remit the 'temporal punishment' due to our sins. That means that the consequences our sins are wiped out and any need for purgatory due to our sin is totally remitted. We can obtain an indulgence either for ourselves, or for the soul of someone in purgatory.

An example that perhaps illustrates these points might help. A child playing with a ball breaks a window at home. Contrite they go to their father, who forgives them. However, despite the forgiveness the window is still broken and still needs to be repaired. Since the child can't pay in full for a new window, the father requires them to forego some pocket money for several weeks, but the father, will pay the rest. This balances justice and mercy. To ask the child to do nothing, when it is possible for them to make some reparation, would not be in accordance with the truth, or even the child's own good. Yet, even this worldly debt is beyond the child's means. Therefore, from his own goodness the father generously makes up what the child cannot provide themselves. *This is indulgence*. Unlike protestant theologies that say "we are washed in the blood of the Lamb and there is nothing left to do," the teaching of the Church has always respected the natural order of justice, as Jesus clearly did in the Gospels, yet recognises that we cannot foresee or undo all the consequences of our own sin. God in His mercy will satisfy justice for what we cannot repair and in His love wipes away what is lacking in us... Indulgences are important, beautiful and another sign of God's merciful love.
