HOLY YEAR STUDY COURSES (STARTING THIS TUESDAY)

As part of our Jubilee activities, I am going to run several study courses throughout the year for people who wish to learn more about their faith and deepen their knowledge and understanding. The first course of the year will be taking an in depth look at *The Creed*, something that we recite every Sunday and is very familiar but we may not know much about. The study sessions will take the form of a video presentation of around 45/50mins followed by a chance for questions and discussion. These will take place in the parish room at St Alban's at **6pm on a Tuesday** evening. Mass follows at 7pm for those who wish to stay. The other course later in the year will look at: *The Mass* and *The Sacraments*.

FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

I see that the new film *Conclave* is leading the way in terms of nominations for this year's BAFTA awards, according to the paper this morning. If you haven't seen it yet, I wouldn't bother. I went to see it a couple of weeks ago with a few of the Fathers and being the only one who had read the book previously, I knew about the absurd and ridiculous twist that was coming at the end of the film. I didn't spoil it for them because I wanted to see their reactions but needless to say, they weren't very impressed. Nor were we particularly enthralled by the poorly researched costumes or scenery... but only we would probably notice that. Anyway...One question that seems to always interest people and I get asked about often relates to the nature of the Church's hierarchy. What really is a Cardinal? Yes, they wear red, but what else do they do and how are they chosen? (Famously, their red cassock is symbolic of their willingness to shed their own blood for the Church.)

A cardinal is one of the most senior ecclesiastical positions within the Church. Cardinals are considered the chief advisers and officials of the Pope, and they play crucial roles in governance. Cardinals are appointed directly by the reigning Pope. This selection is totally personal and is often based on the individual's service, loyalty, and contributions to the Church. The title "cardinal" actually comes from the Latin word "cardo," meaning hinge, signifying their role as pivotal to the Church's structure.

The Pope looks to appoint men from different countries and cultural backgrounds, emphasising the universal nature of the Church. This diversity is not just geographical but also reflects various traditions and perspectives across the Catholic world. Beyond administration, however, cardinals are called to be spiritual leaders. They are expected to exemplify holiness, providing spiritual guidance not only within their local dioceses but also on a global scale through their significant public influence. As things stand there are currently 244 living cardinals (407,730 priests, 5340 bishops). However, only cardinals under the age of 80 are eligible to vote in a *conclave* to elect a new Pope. These are known as cardinal-electors and there are currently 139 of them. This number does fluctuate though, as members of the college turn 80 and new members are appointed. (Interestingly, the word that we use for a papal election, *conclave*, comes from the two Latin words con clave, literally meaning, with a key, referring to the fact that cardinals are locked in Sistine Chapel as they deliberate and vote).

Within the College of Cardinals, there exists a distinction between those who are primarily diocesan bishops and those who hold positions in the Roman Curia. (That is the name for the central administrative departments of the Vatican which govern the Church throughout the world. There are 16 Vatican departments in total, each headed by a "prefect", these prefects effectively make up the Pope's cabinet.) Diocesan bishops: These cardinals are heads of (arch)dioceses around the world. They are primarily focused on pastoral care, governance, and the spiritual leadership of their local Church communities. A cardinal who is an Archbishop of a major city like New York or Paris serves both as a leader of his local Church and as a member of the College of Cardinals. E.g. Cardinal Nichols of Westminster. Curial Cardinals: While their work might seem more administrative, as heads of departments, it carries a profound spiritual dimension. They help shape Church policy, clarify doctrine, and promote universal pastoral initiatives. Their roles require prayerful discernment to ensure that the Church's governance reflects her divine mission. E.g. Cardinal Roche, our former bishop.

Not the most spiritual reflection, I know, but hopefully this will answer a few questions that I've had since the film came out. Despite what we thought, I'm sure it will win plenty of awards...
