#### FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

October is, of course, the month of the Holy Rosary, it receives this designation because of the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary always occurs on the 7<sup>th</sup> of this month. As we have discussed in bulletins past, the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary marks the victory on the 7<sup>th</sup> of October 1571, of the Holy League (a collection of Catholic states coordinated by Pope St Pius V) against the muslim hoards seeking to invade and overrun Europe. Pope Pius ordered the churches of Rome be open day and night for prayer leading up to the battle and urged the priests and people of the city to pray the Rosary. When word reached Rome that the Ottoman fleet had been defeated decisively, the Pope declared that the 7<sup>th</sup> of October be a feast day in honour of Our Lady of Victories. Pope Gregory XIII renamed this feast Our Lady of the Rosary.

At its core, the Rosary is a meditative prayer that centres our hearts and minds on the life of Christ. Each set of mysteries, Joyful, Sorrowful and Glorious, invite us to contemplate key moments in Our Lord's life, seen through the eyes of His Blessed Mother. As we repeat the familiar prayers of the Hail Mary and the Our Father, we are drawn into these mysteries in a rhythm that encourages reflection, peace, and intimacy with God. Far from being the "vain repetition" that protestants so often like to call it, the Rosary is deeply scriptural. The Hail Mary is drawn from the words of the Archangel Gabriel and St Elizabeth in the Gospel of Luke. The Our Father is the prayer that Jesus Himself taught us. By praying the Rosary, we are literally speaking the words of Scripture and allowing them to shape our hearts.

The Rosary has also long been associated with Marian apparitions and messages. One of the most well-known instances is Our Lady of Fatima, who appeared to three shepherd children in Portugal in 1917. She repeatedly asked the children and through them, all of us, to pray the Rosary daily for the conversion of sinners and for peace in the world. Our Lady, our spiritual mother, always leads us to her Son. When we pray the Rosary, we are not only honouring her but also following her guidance to "Do whatever He tells you". The Rosary is her gift to us, a simple yet profound way to remain close to her Divine Son.

Saints and popes throughout the centuries have spoken of the Rosary as a spiritual weapon. St Padre Pio called it "the weapon for these times." Pope Leo XIII, known as the "Rosary Pope," issued numerous encyclicals promoting its use. Pope St John Paul II, who had a deep devotion to the Rosary, said it "marks the rhythm of human life, bringing it into harmony with the rhythm of God's own life." When we face struggles, whether personal, societal, or spiritual, the Rosary is a source of strength. In times of anxiety, temptation or doubt, taking the Rosary into our hands is like reaching out to our Mother for help. It anchors us in prayer, reminds us of God's love, and empowers us to resist evil.

The beauty of the Rosary lies in its simplicity and adaptability. You can pray it in a group or alone, at home or while commuting, in joy or in sorrow. It's a prayer for all ages and all seasons of life. Parents can teach it to their children, the elderly can pray it quietly in their homes. No matter your walk of life, the Rosary meets you where you are. If you haven't already made the Rosary a part of your daily spiritual routine, October is the perfect time to begin. Start small ... just a decade a day if that's manageable. Over time, the rhythm and peace of the Rosary will become a cherished part of your relationship with God.

The Rosary is not just a prayer, it is a lifeline. It draws us closer to Jesus, teaches us to see through Our Lady's eyes and strengthens us for our journey of faith. In a world filled with noise, division and distraction, the Rosary is a gentle but powerful call to peace, reflection, and holiness. Let us take up our beads and pray with confidence, knowing that through the Rosary, Heaven is nearer than we realise.
