FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

Lent is a season of turning back to God—a time to strip away what weighs us down and seek His mercy. At the heart of this journey lies the Sacrament of Confession, a gift we too often neglect. As your parish priest, I urge you this Lent to approach the sacrament not as a duty (although I do expect you to go!), but as a grace-filled encounter with Christ's love. To understand its power, I want to say a bit about the difference between *contrition* and *attrition*, how God enables us to be truly contrite, and why our Act of Contrition boldly promises, "I will not sin again."

When we prepare for Confession, we examine our conscience, but what moves us to confess? The Church distinguishes two kinds of sorrow for sin: *contrition* and *attrition*. *Contrition*—sometimes called "perfect contrition"—is sorrow born of love for God. We grieve our sins because they offend the One who is all-good, who died for us, whose friendship we cherish above all. It's the pain of a child who's hurt a loving parent, longing to restore that bond. *Attrition*, or "imperfect contrition," stems from less noble motives: fear of hell, shame at being caught out, or dread of punishment. It's real sorrow, but it's more about self-preservation than selfless love. Both can lead us to Confession—*attrition* is enough for absolution when joined to the sacrament—but *contrition* is the gold standard. Why? Because it aligns our hearts with God's, healing us more deeply. Lent, with its focus on Christ's Passion, invites us to move beyond fear toward love. When we gaze at the Cross, we see not just judgment, but a Saviour who bore our sins. This Lent, ask yourself: Is my sorrow rooted in love for Him, or merely in fear for myself? Either way, come to Confession—God meets us where we are—but let's pray for the grace to grow in *contrition*.

Here's the good news: we don't manufacture *contrition* on our own. It's a gift of grace, poured into us by the Holy Spirit. The Catechism teaches that *contrition* "arises from a love by which God is loved above all else" (CCC 1452), and this love isn't our achievement—it's God's work in us. Think of the Prodigal Son: he starts with *attrition*, planning a speech to avoid starvation, but his father's embrace stirs something deeper—a sorrow rooted in love (Luke 15:11-32). So it is with us. In Lent, God floods us with opportunities for grace: Scripture, the Stations of the Cross, fasting, prayer. These stir our hearts, softening them to see sin's cost—not just to us, but to Him. Practically, this means Confession isn't a solo act. Before you come, spend time with Jesus—perhaps at Adoration or with a crucifix in your hand—and ask for *contrition*. Say, "Lord, help me love You more than my sin." He will. I've seen it in the confessional: penitents who arrive anxious and fearful and leave with tears of gratitude, their sorrow transformed by grace. This Lent, trust that God wants to give you this gift. He's not waiting to scold, but to heal.

In the Act of Contrition, we pray, "and with the help of Thy grace, I will not sin again." Notice the boldness: "I will not sin again". It is not good enough to say: "I'll try not to." Why such confidence when we know our weakness? It's not arrogance—it's faith in God's power. The Church teaches that Confession doesn't just forgive; it strengthens. Through absolution, Christ pours sanctifying grace into us, repairing our will and arming us against temptation. Saying "I will not sin again" isn't a prediction of perfection; it's a commitment to rely on Him who makes all things new. Contrast this with "I'll try": it's honest, but timid, leaning on our frail effort rather than God's might. The firmer resolve reflects the sacrament's truth: we're not alone in the fight. In Lent, this matters doubly. As we fast and pray, we're training our wills to choose God over sin, and Confession seals that resolve with grace. Does this mean we'll never fall? No—we're human. But each Confession renews our strength to say "yes" to God. So when you confess this Lent, mean those words. Tell Him, "With Your help, I will not sin again," and step out trusting that He'll carry you forward.
