FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

From time to time and especially since the appointment of Sarah Mullally as the Archbishop of Canterbury some people have asked me with concern and thoughtfulness, why the Church does not ordain women as priests. It is an important question, especially in a world where the role of women in leadership has rightly received greater attention in recent years. As your parish priest I want to offer a reflection that is honest and grounded in both Scripture and Tradition.

Let me begin by saying that this is not a question about the dignity or worth of women or indeed their ability. I am sure there are plenty of women who would make marvellous priests on a practical day to day level. But the teaching of the Church regarding the priesthood is about 'being' not about 'doing', the reasons are spiritual and theological, not functional. The Church teaches clearly and without hesitation that men and women are equal in dignity, both created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). Women have played vital roles in the life of the Church from the very beginning. Our Blessed Lady, the Mother of God, stands above all the saints, Mary Magdalene was the first witness of the Resurrection and many women, from the early martyrs to modern saints like Thérèse of Lisieux and Catherine of Siena, have helped shape the Church through their witness, holiness and leadership.

The question of the priesthood, however, is not about power or status. It is about a particular sacramental role within the life of the Church. The priest is not simply a leader or a preacher, he is to be a living icon of Christ in the world. The priest is ordained to act in *the person of Christ*, especially in the celebration of the sacraments, above all in the Eucharist. When the priest says "This is **MY** body" or "I absolve you", it is Jesus Christ who speaks. The priest therefore must have a <u>spousal</u> relationship to the Church, which is Christ's Holy <u>Bride</u>.

At the Last Supper, Our Blessed Lord instituted the priesthood when He said to the Apostles, "Do this in memory of me" (Luke 22:19). From the beginning, the Church has understood that He entrusted this specific role to the Apostles, who were all men. This is not because women were unworthy or incapable. Jesus regularly broke social conventions by speaking with women, healing them and praising their faith. He had many women among His followers. Yet, when it came to choosing those who would share in His priestly ministry in this particular way, He chose men. Some might say this was simply a reflection of the culture of the time. But Jesus was never afraid to challenge social norms. His decision to choose only men as Apostles was deliberate and purposeful and the Church has always understood this as binding.

St John Paul II in his 1994 apostolic letter *Ordinatio Sacerdotalis*, affirmed infallibly this unbroken tradition. He wrote, "The Church has no authority whatsoever to confer priestly ordination on women and that this judgment is to be definitively held by all the Church's faithful." In other words, this is not something the Church is free to change, even if she wanted to. It is not a matter of 'discrimination' in the modern sense of the word but of fidelity to Christ's example and intention.

This can be hard for some to accept, especially when we see the gifts, holiness and leadership of so many women in the Church. It is right to desire that these gifts be fully recognised and valued. The Church needs women in theology, catechesis, pastoral care and leadership. Women serve as religious sisters, consecrated virgins, theologians, canon lawyers, spiritual directors and much more. Their role is essential to the life and mission of the Church. But the priesthood is not the only or the highest form of service. All of us, by baptism, share in the priesthood of Christ. And holiness is the greatest vocation of all. As St Thérèse of Lisieux once said, "In the heart of the Church, my mother, I will be love." That is the call for each of us, man or woman, to be love in the heart of the Church.

I know that some will still find this teaching difficult. I understand those feelings and I do not dismiss them. But I hope this explanation helps a little bit, to show that the Church's teaching is not based on inequality or fear of change. It is rooted in faithfulness to Christ, who gave us the sacraments and entrusted the priesthood to the Apostles and their successors. Anyway, its all well above my paygrade. So don't shoot the messenger
