# FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

Until last week, I suspect that most people in this country had never heard of Charlie Kirk, (whose funeral takes place today). His recent assassination has propelled his name to the into the headlines and his tragic death has made news all over the world. This atrocity forms part of a disturbing, indeed, alarming trend both in the United States and here in Britian, towards political violence, including, politically motivated murder. An American legislator and her husband were killed in June of this year in the State of Minnesota and of course, Jo Cox and Sir David Amess, members of our own parliament were both murdered in very recent memory.

First and foremost, this is a tragedy on a human level. A young husband and father was shot in the throat, his jugular ripped open by a rifle bullet in front of a crowd of thousands, including his wife and young daughter. A more traumatic and dreadful event is hard to imagine. It would be reasonable to expect that such an incident would elicit universal sympathy, dismay and condemnation and yet, remarkably, this has not been the case. The most shocking part of this whole sorry affair, to my mind at least, has been the glee that so many of Kirk's detractors have taken in his murder. In some quarters there has been open celebration, in others, a sort of victim blaming and hand wringing 'he brought it on himself' and the like.

Having reflected further on this, however, I realised that perhaps I should not have been so surprised to see such callousness. An atmosphere of mutual antagonism which often descends into outright hatred has been fostered in our society for too many years. And it is precisely this hate filled attitude which makes the idea of political murder appealing to some and excusable to others. This is not entirely new, since our civilisation became forgetful of God, or even hostile towards Him, large numbers of people have embraced these wicked ideas. History gives us many examples of this way of thinking: the Jacobins of the French Revolution, the Communists of the Russian Revolution, the Nazis of the German Revolution. In each case, political murder was praised as a way of building the society they wanted: "He deserved it, he's a monarchist." "He deserved it, he's a Jew." We must be honest, whenever we hear or think to ourselves, "he deserved it, he's one of them," we hear the echo of that very same evil.

What was Charlie Kirk's crime then? Speaking truths that too many people refuse to hear. Truths that until just a few years ago we all took for granted. Men cannot have babies. A woman cannot become a man. Human life begins at conception etc. These are not radical or extreme ideas; they are simply statements of reality and very basic teachings of the Church. "Hate speech" is what he was accused of by some. Rather, it was simply speech that people hated to hear. He was feared by others because he was changing the minds of college students, revealing to them the insanity of what they were being taught. He once said "when people quit talking, that's when you get violence". He invited discussion and debate, in fact, the speaking tour that he was participating in when he was murdered was entitled "*Prove me Wrong*", he freely welcomed challenge and questioning of his opinions. We can never and must never hate our brothers and sisters simply for their ideas, no matter how fervently we may disagree with them.

Our faith's response to this has always been clear from the very beginning, and I quote from the First Letter of St John: "Do not be like Cain, who was of the Evil One and murdered his brother... We know that we have passed from death to life, because we love. Whoever does not love abides in death. Everyone who hates his brother is a murderer and you know that no murderer has eternal life abiding in him." It is this final sentence which brings this home to us. None of us have done such violence to another, please God. But have we allowed ourselves to descend into hatred? Have we turned on the news, opened a newspaper or gone on the internet and felt hatred, even if it seemed like they deserved it. St John does not say "everyone who hates his brother... except the really nasty ones." He condemns all hatred. Our response to this and any such tragedy must always be one of love and prayerful compassion. Each and everyone one of us is made in God's image and likeness and until we start treating each other as such, history is doomed to repeat itself.
