

ASSISTED SUICIDE

Kim Leadbeater, the MP behind this appalling and morally reprehensible Assisted Suicide legislation will be speaking at Halifax Minster on Sunday 6th April 6:00pm-7:00pm. <u>I encourage as many of you as possible to attend and voice your objections in any way that you can</u>. Here are some examples of proposed safeguards that have been voted down and rejected at the bill's committee stage in parliament:

- ➤ Prohibition on "encouraging" someone towards assisted suicide | Voted down 15-8
- **★** Requirement to meet with palliative care consultant before choosing suicide Voted down 15 -8
 - **★** 6 month terminal diagnosis must have "reasonable certainty" | Voted down 15-8
 - \times Strengthen language to exclude disability and mental illness | Voted down 15 8
 - \times Doctor must record and report drug complications | Voted down 14 7
 - \times Doctor must remain in room with patient until death | Voted down 13 8
- ➤ Doctors must not bring up assisted suicide unless patient mentions it first | Voted down 13 8

FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

As Lent unfolds, it has been wonderful to see the parish turn with renewed devotion to the Stations of the Cross - a cherished practice that invites us to walk alongside Jesus on His journey to Calvary. This meditative tradition, rich in history and spiritual depth, holds a special place in the Church, especially during this season of penance and reflection. But what are the origins of this devotion?

The notion of the Stations of the Cross began centuries ago with the faithful who journeyed to Jerusalem as pilgrims, eager to follow the path Our Lord trod to His crucifixion. Known as the *Via Dolorosa*, or "Sorrowful Way," this route through the Holy City became a sacred itinerary, marked by key moments of Christ's Passion. By the 4th and 5th centuries, pilgrims like Sr Egeria, a Spanish nun, documented their experiences of retracing these steps, laying the groundwork for what would become a widespread devotion.

For most Christians, however, such a pilgrimage was impossible due to distance, cost, or general conflict and pestilence. In response, many churches brought the *Via Dolorosa* home. By the Middle Ages, European monasteries and churches began to erect outdoor scenes or markers representing Christ's journey. These early "stations" varied in number and form—sometimes as few as seven, sometimes more. Over time, the devotion evolved, and in 1731, Pope Clement XII fixed the number at 14, standardising the sequence we know today: from Jesus' condemnation to His burial in the tomb. This structure ensures that every Catholic, regardless of location, can unite in the same prayerful journey.

More than a historical re-enactment, the Stations of the Cross are a profound spiritual exercise. Each station—from Jesus accepting His cross to Veronica wiping His face—offers a window into the depth of His suffering and love. This devotion is not passive; it calls us to active participation. We are invited to imagine ourselves in the scene, to feel the weight of the cross, the sting of the scourging, and the tenderness of Our Lady's sorrow. Through this, we come to see Christ's Passion as personal—not just an event of the past, but a living reality that touches our lives.

The Stations also remind us of our own crosses. Life brings its share of struggles—grief, illness, uncertainty—and Jesus' journey shows us that He has walked this road first. Praying the Stations unites our trials to His, transforming them into opportunities for grace and redemption. Lent, with its 40 days of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, mirrors Jesus' time in the desert and prepares us for the Paschal Mystery—His death and resurrection. The Stations of the Cross are a perfect companion for this season. Traditionally prayed on Fridays during Lent, they draw us into the heart of Christ's sacrifice, which we commemorate on Good Friday. Each station deepens our repentance, helping us to take up our cross and follow Him, as we shed distractions and draw closer to God.

In today's fast-moving world, the Stations of the Cross stand as a countercultural gift. They ask us to pause, to be still, and to ponder truths that transcend time. They teach us empathy as we witness the suffering of Jesus and those who stood by Him—Mary, Simon of Cyrene, the weeping women. They inspire gratitude for the salvation won through His blood. And they renew our hope, pointing beyond the tomb to the glory of Easter. As we approach Holy Week, may this devotion awaken our hearts to the One who carried the cross for us. Through the Stations, we not only remember the past—we prepare for the future, when sorrow and grief will give way to eternal life and joy.
