FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

Following on from last week's look at the liturgical calendar this week, we celebrate the *memorias* of two extraordinary saints. On the 27th of August, we celebrate St. Monica, the devoted mother whose unwavering prayers transformed the life of her wayward son and on the following day we celebrate, him, St. Augustine of Hippo, one of the Church's greatest theologians and Doctors. These feasts invite us to reflect on the vital role of prayer in our lives, particularly in seeking the conversion of our loved ones and in offering prayers for the faithful departed.

St Monica's story is one of relentless hope amid heartache. Born in North Africa in the 4th century, she married a pagan man and raised three children, including her brilliant but rebellious son, Augustine. Augustine, known for his intellectual scepticism and loose living, seemed far from the faith that his mother cherished. For over 17 years she prayed fervently for his conversion, shedding tears that, as he later wrote in his book *The Confessions* that "watered the seeds of his soul." She sought advice from bishops, followed him across continents and never ceased her pleas to God. Her persistence paid off when Augustine, influenced by his friend St Ambrose and an encounter with Scripture, embraced Christianity at the age of 33. He was baptised in AD 387 and went on to become a bishop, philosopher, and an ardent defender of the faith.

This mother-son duo reminds us of the importance of praying for the conversion of our loved ones with unwavering persistence. In a world full of distractions, secularism, doubt, addiction and indifference, many of us have family members and friends who have lapsed from the faith or have no faith at all. St Monica teaches us that prayer is not just a one-time petition but a lifelong commitment. As Jesus urges in the Gospel, we must "pray always and not lose heart." Persistent prayer aligns our will with God's, fostering patience and trust in His timing. It transforms us as much as those we pray for, deepening our reliance on His mercy. No soul is beyond God's reach.

Yet, the call to prayer extends well beyond the living. These feasts also prompt us to remember the Holy Souls in purgatory, for whom our prayers provide assistance in their purification. On her death bed, St Monica's said to her son, "Bury my body wherever you will; let not care of it cause you any concern. One thing only I ask you, that you remember me at the altar of the Lord wherever you may be." Agustine did just that. We must never forget that death does not sever our communion with the saints and the departed. Praying for the dead is an act of charity, rooted in the fact that God's mercy extends into eternity.

Nowhere are we closer to the dead than at Mass, where heaven and earth converge at God's altar. The Eucharist is the supreme prayer of the Church, uniting us with Christ's sacrifice on Calvary. During the Eucharistic Prayer, we explicitly remember the dead, offering the merits of Jesus' Body and Blood for their relief. As the veil between the living and the dead thins in this sacred mystery, our intentions become part of that eternal offering. St Augustine described the Mass as a bridge to the afterlife, where the faithful departed benefit from our participation. Even simple acts, like lighting a candle or reciting the Eternal Rest draw us into this communion.

In celebrating St Monica and St Augustine this week, we are called to a vibrant prayer life that embraces both the living and the dead. Their teaching challenges us: Do not grow weary in praying for conversions, for God's grace works miracles in hidden ways. And remember the souls who have gone before us, especially at Mass, where we stand closest to them in the presence of the Almighty. May these saints intercede for our us, inspiring us to persist in faith, hope and love.
