FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

As I am writing this piece, it is currently Friday morning and I'm very much looking forward to this evening when I will be able to watch the series finale of "The Traitors". I always enjoy rubbish reality TV, but this series is different. It is so much more compelling than other programmes. For those of you who don't watch it, the game brings together a group of contestants known as the "faithful" who must work to identify and eliminate "traitors" among them, who secretly work to sabotage the group's efforts to win a cash prize. The game involves banishing other players, strategy and deception. It's just brilliant. The physiological intrigue, the social dynamics and the element of mystery make for a fascinating insight into the human condition and showcase just how easily people can be manipulated.

At the end of a contestant's time on the show, they have to stand up in front of the whole group and publically reveal, were they a traitor, or were they faithful. I can't help but watch the programme and draw parallels with our own lives. First of all, the phenomenon of treachery is as old as the hills. Even among the Lord's twelve Apostles, there was a traitor in their midst, who made it almost to the very end. Human weakness and sinfulness will always mean that there are people who choose to put their own needs ahead of others and who will willing lie and cheat their way to their goals. Obviously, this is the aim of the game, *Traitors*, and so ultimately is only for fun and the show has no consequences.

At the end of our lives, however, when the time for judgment comes, the Lord will ask us to give an account of ourselves and ask us if we have been faithful to him. Thankfully for us, as we journey through life, there are no nightly banishments, we are not going to be chucked out of the group forever, but we are regularly faced with opportunities for redemption and growth. Living a life of true fidelity requires God's grace and the cultivation of real integrity. Living out our faith not just in public but in private moments, when no one else is watching, it's about aligning our actions with our beliefs.

I was chatting with some Pentecostal ministers recently, who asked me what would one have to do to be "kicked out" of the Catholic Church? They were quite shocked when I explained to them, that it's almost impossible. We become part of God's family of 'faithfuls' upon our baptism and there's nothing we can do to change that. We might say that some people are more practicing than others, or that some people live lives far more in keeping with what God wants for us — but there is no banishment, the door of mercy is never closed, no matter what we have done or how far we have fallen. (Yes, it is possible to be 'excommunicated' but 1. it is extremely rare and 2. is <u>never</u> irreversible. It is not a punishment but an encouragement to conversion and repentance.)

When the pope dies, all of the cardinals and bishops in Rome lose their positions in the curia until a new pope is elected and reconfirms them in office. All of them, except a bishop who is known as the "penitentiary" – his role involves reconciling people to the church, forgiving grave sins and lifting excommunications, it is for this reason that his office is never vacant, reconciliation is always available.

If we are to live truly faithful lives, there are so many elements from which we can draw strength and support. Primarily, to live a faithful life, is to live a sacramental life, to attend Mass, to receive the Lord in Holy Communion, to regularly confess our sins and experience His forgiveness. The game of life has so many twists are turns along the way, but if we are to attain the eternal prize, of which St Paul speaks, we must fight the good fight, run the race and keep the faith to the end.
