# FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

On the outskirts of Rome, just across the road from one of my favourite lunch spots, the Basilica of St Paul Outside the Walls stands as a testament to the great Apostle to the Gentiles. Built over the tomb of St Paul, who was martyred around AD 67, this majestic structure is one of Rome's four major Papal Basilicas. Its history is a long and complicated one of destruction and renewal. This church has been ravaged by earthquakes, invasions and devastating fires, yet faithfully rebuilt each time. It is one of the main pilgrimage sites of the Eternal City but few may know of its deep and centuries old connection to the English crown, a link that was brought into sharp relief this week by the State visit of the King and Queen to the Holy See.

This bond goes all the way back to the Anglo-Saxon period, a time when England was a patchwork of kingdoms gradually embracing Christianity. Beginning in the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> centuries, Anglo-Saxon kings assumed a special role as protectors of the Basilica. Much like how the kings of France held guardianship over the Basilica of St Mary Major, English monarchs supported the maintenance and preservation of St Paul's tomb and the surrounding abbey. Historical records suggest that kings such as Ine of Wessex, who abdicated in 726 to retire to Rome and Offa of Mercia, known for his holiness and loyalty to the Papacy, contributed to the Basilica's upkeep. These rulers sent money, pilgrims and even materials for repairs, especially after disasters like the Saracen raid of 846, which left the Basilica in ruins.

This patronage was more than simply financial, it was a spiritual alliance. Anglo-Saxon England, converted largely through the efforts of missionaries like St Augustine of Canterbury sent by Pope Gregory the Great in 597, recognised Rome as the heart of Christendom. Kings paid "Peter's Pence," an annual contribution to the Holy See (some things never change) and many made pilgrimages to the Eternal City. The Basilica of St Paul, with its apostolic significance, became a focal point for English devotion. Records from the time, including the writings of St Bede, highlight how English bishops and nobles frequented the site, fostering a sense of unity between our distant island and the papal court. This relationship flourished through the medieval period, with successive monarchs upholding the tradition until the disasters of the 16<sup>th</sup> century. The so-called "reformation" marked a rupture in this historic tie. Under King Henry VIII, England's break from the Church in 1534 severed formal connections with Roman institutions, including the Basilica. The dissolution of monasteries and the establishment of the Church of England shifted allegiances and the English crown's role as protector faded into memory. For nearly 500 years the link lay dormant, a poignant reminder of the divisions that have plagued the Body of Christ.

Yet, just this week, a very small step has been taken to symbolically revive this bond. Just days ago, the King and Queen visited the Basilica as part of their state visit to the Holy See. In a ceremony presided over by Abbot Donato Ogliari and Cardinal James Harvey, the King was bestowed the title of "Royal Confrater" of the Benedictine Abbey attached to the Basilica, a gesture approved by the Holy Father. This "confraternity," meaning spiritual brotherhood, echoes the ancient protectorship. A specially crafted throne, adorned with the royal coat of arms and inscribed with "Ut unum sint" "That they may be one" from St John's Gospel, was installed in the apse for the King and his successors. In reciprocity, the Pope was named "Papal Confrère" of St George's Chapel at Windsor Castle. These are, of course, small gestures and the theological gulf between the Church of England and the Catholic Church is wider than ever but they do offer a moment of reflection, in an age of division, such signs remind us of the need to strive for the unity among believers for which our Lord so fervently prayed.
