FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

As the chill of February lingers on into March, we step into the sacred season of Lent, a time marked by quiet resolve and tender hope. It begins this week with Ash Wednesday, a day when we stand before God and one another, marked with the stark sign of our mortality: "Remember thou art dust, and to dust thou shalt return." These words, spoken as ashes are traced upon our foreheads, are not meant to crush us or frighten us, but to awaken us. They remind us of our frailty, yes, but also of our dependence on the One who breathed life into dust and calls us still to rise again with Him.

Ash Wednesday sets the tone for the forty days ahead, a season of intentional turning—turning away from what binds us and turning toward what frees us. At the heart of this turning is the practice of fasting, a discipline as old as the faith itself. But what is the purpose of this self-denial, this wilful letting go of food or comfort or habit? It is not mere punishment, nor an empty ritual to prove how holy we are. Fasting is a training of the will, a way to remind ourselves that we are more than our appetites, more than our fleeting desires. When we say "no" to something small—a meal, a luxury, a distraction—we strengthen our capacity to say "yes" to something greater: the love of God and the love of neighbour.

The forty days of Lent mirror the forty days our Lord spent in the wilderness, fasting and praying, facing temptation not for His own sake but to prepare for the mission of mercy that lay ahead. Like Him, we are called to discipline our wills not as an end in itself, but as a means to an end—to become more loving, more attuned to the heart of God and the needs of those around us. When we fast, we create space: space to feel the hunger of the poor, space to hear the cry of the lonely, space to recognise where we have fallen short in generosity or patience or forgiveness. In that space, God works, softening our edges, deepening our compassion.

The penances of Lent—whether fasting, prayer, or acts of charity—are not about earning God's favour; they are about preparing our hearts to receive it more fully. Imagine, then, where we might be in forty days' time. If we enter this season with resolve, letting the ashes of Wednesday mark not just our foreheads but our souls, we can emerge at Easter as people more loving than we are today. The irritability we seek to tame through fasting can become kindness. The time we reclaim from distractions can become time for others. The excess that we surrender can become generosity shared.

This is the quiet miracle of Lent: it takes what is dusty and fragile within us and, through discipline and grace, shapes it into something radiant. As we walk these forty days, let us hold this purpose close: not to punish ourselves, but to free ourselves—to love more deeply, more truly, as Christ loves us. By Easter, may we rise not only with Him but like Him, our wills disciplined, our hearts enlarged, ready to pour out love in a world so desperately in need of it.
