FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

And suddenly, it's already the fourth Sunday of Lent. Also known as *Laetare* Sunday, today we have a small break from our Lenten penance as we can feel the joy of Easter almost in sight. We also celebrate on this day, Mothering Sunday, a tradition of faith and love—that calls us to honour not only the mothers who have shaped our lives but also the profound spiritual motherhood that sustains us as Catholics. The roots of Mothering Sunday reach deep into medieval Britain. On this day, people would return to their "mother church"—the cathedral or principal church of their region—for Mass. For many, especially young servants and labourers working far from home, this journey offered a rare chance to reunite with family. They brought tokens of affection, like the rich, fruit-laden simnel cake, to their mothers, blending spiritual devotion with earthly gratitude. Over time, this custom softened and shifted, evolving into the Mothering Sunday we know today, a day to celebrate the women who nurture, sacrifice, and love us into being.

Yet the heart of Mothering Sunday pulses with a broader invitation—to recognise the motherhood that transcends the human family and draws us into the divine. The Church herself, often called Holy Mother Church, stands as our eternal carer. She is the vessel of God's grace, the one who births us into faith through Baptism, feeds us with the Eucharist, and guides us with wisdom through her teaching. Like a mother rocking her child through restless nights, the Church holds us in times of doubt and sorrow, offering comfort and hope. She is both tender and strong, her arms wide enough to embrace the weary, her voice firm enough to call us back when we stray. In her liturgy and community, we find a reflection of God's own love—a love that does not merely provide but transforms, shaping us into the people we are meant to be. To call the Church our mother is to see her as more than an institution; she is a living presence, a nurturer who labours tirelessly for our salvation.

And then there is Mary, the Blessed Virgin, whose motherhood shines as a beacon across time and eternity. Chosen by God to bear His Son, Mary's *fiat*—"Let it be done to me according to your word" (Luke 1:38)—was an act of breath-taking trust, a mother's surrender to a purpose far greater than herself. She carried Jesus in her womb, nursed Him at her breast, and followed Him to the Cross, her heart pierced by the sword of sorrow (Luke 2:35). Yet her motherhood did not end with her earthly life. At Golgotha, as Our Lord hung dying, He looked upon her and the beloved disciple, saying, "Woman, behold your son," and to the disciple, "Behold your mother" (John 19:26-27). In that moment, Mary became ours—our advocate, our intercessor, our mother in faith. She who cradled the infant Christ now cradles us, gently guiding us to her Son with a love that is both fierce and tender. In her, we see the perfect harmony of human and divine motherhood, a woman who said yes to God and, in doing so, became a mother to all who seek Him.

This Mothering Sunday, then, is a tapestry of gratitude and of grace. We give thanks for our earthly mothers—those who gave birth to us, raised us, or stepped into that role through for us, through countless acts of care. We honour Holy Mother Church, whose steadfast love anchors us in a world of change. And we turn to Mary, our Blessed Mother, whose quiet strength and boundless compassion remind us that we are never alone. Together, these threads of motherhood—human, ecclesial, and divine—reveal the heart of God, who loves us with a mother's fierceness, a mother's patience, and a mother's unending hope. As we celebrate this day, may we rest in that love, and may we carry it forth, nurturing one another as we journey toward Easter's promise.
