#### **FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST**

Well, Lent is off to a great start, it was wonderful to see the huge number of people who attended on Ash Wednesday across all four Masses. (I don't know where they all came from!) And as I am writing this piece, we have just concluded the first of our Friday penitential Masses at 7:00am, which 40 hardy souls managed to attend. I really encourage you to join them next week as an act of penance and devotion. It's a great way to start the day and a concrete resolution that you can make to get the most out of Lent as you can.

As we journey through this holy season —a time of penance, prayer, and preparation for the Paschal Mystery—we are called to unite our sacrifices with the Cross of Our Lord. This year, our Lenten path takes on a sombre and profound weight as we hear tragic news from the Democratic Republic of the Congo. On the 13<sup>th</sup> of February seventy of our Christian brothers and sisters were brutally beheaded in a Protestant church in Kasanga, a village in the North Kivu province. Reports indicate that militants from the Allied Democratic Forces (ADF), a group tied to islamic 'extremists', carried out this horrific act, screaming "allahu akbar" as they cut off their victims heads. These believers—men, women, and <a href="mailto:children">children</a>—were taken from their homes tied up, and slaughtered in a sacred space meant for worship and refuge. Not that you'll hear much about it from the BBC or the British press.

This news should pierce our hearts, yet it also echoes the very essence of Lent. The martyrdom of these Congolese Christians reminds us of the cost of discipleship, a cost that Our Lord Himself foretold: "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24). In their suffering, these modern martyrs bore witness to their faith, even unto death. Like the martyrs of old, they join the great cloud of witnesses who reflect the ultimate sacrifice of Christ on the Cross—a sacrifice we contemplate deeply during these forty days and nights.

Lent invites us to repent, to strip away what distracts us from God, and to stand in solidarity with those who suffer. The Christians of the Congo, facing escalating violence, cry out in words that resonate with our own Lenten struggles. A church elder there said, "We don't know what to do or how to pray; we've had enough of massacres. May God's will alone be done." These words mirror the agony of Jesus in Gethsemane: "Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will have it" (Matthew 26:39). In their surrender to God's will amid unimaginable pain, our Congolese brethren teach us the depth of trust and abandonment that Lent calls us to embrace.

As a parish, let us respond to this tragedy with the tools of our faith. During Lent, we fast not merely for ourselves but to unite with those who hunger—physically and spiritually—around the world. Let us offer our fasting for the people of the Congo, that they may find peace and protection. We pray, too, for the perpetrators of this violence, that their hearts may turn from satanic hatred to repentance, as Christ prayed for those who crucified Him: "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). And let us give alms generously, as a tangible sign of our communion with those who suffer. This is why it is so important that we support our Lenten charity, Aid to the Church in Need.

The ashes we received on Ash Wednesday remind us of our own mortality, but they also point to the hope of resurrection. The martyrs of the Congo, though their lives were taken, now live in the eternal embrace of God. As we approach Holy Week, their witness urges us to carry our own crosses with courage, knowing that the Cross leads to Easter. May their sacrifice deepen our Lenten journey and renew our resolve to live as faithful disciples. Let us entrust their bereaved families and all who mourn them and are traumatised, to the Blessed Virgin Mary, who stood at the foot of the Cross and ask her intercession for our troubled world.
