FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

Holy Week is a sacred time, a journey through the core of our faith that invites us not only to reflect but to take part. It starts today with Palm Sunday, a day of celebration as Jesus enters Jerusalem on a donkey. The crowds cheer "Hosanna," welcoming Him with excitement, expecting a king to overthrow their oppressors. But His mission is deeper, He's not here to fight Rome, but to free us from sin. It's a hopeful moment, a glimpse of light before things take a heavier turn, setting the stage for what lies ahead. Between Palm Sunday and the days that follow, there's a shift that we cannot ignore—public praise gives way to private plots, as those who feel threatened by Him start to close in, their whispers shaping into plans.

Then comes Maundy Thursday, a quiet but powerful shift. Jesus kneels to wash His disciples' feet, a simple act that flips the idea of greatness upside down. It's not about being over others, but serving them. That same night, at the Last Supper, He takes bread and wine, ordinary things, and turns them into His Body and Blood—a gift so great that even the Angels fall silent - the very heart of all that we believe. Even in this moment of closeness, however, darkness looms. Judas leaves to betray Him, a reminder of how love can so easily be met with rejection. It's a scene that echoes something universal—our own choices laid bare before us. Earlier that week, the tension had already started building—Jesus teaching in the temple, flipping tables, calling out hypocrisy. By Thursday, the air is thick with it and His actions point to a love that does not back down, even when the cost is clear.

Good Friday is dark. Jesus is led to the cross, enduring unthinkable pain and humiliation—not complaining, but steady and silent. The whip, the thorns, the nails—they all do their gruesome work and yet when He is lifted up, it's not just suffering on display – it's glory. "Father, forgive them," He says, and somehow that cross becomes more than a symbol of death—it's a sign of mercy breaking through, it becomes His throne and His altar of sacrifice. His mother stands there, sharing His pain, while the world watches a king laid low. Holy Saturday follows as a strange, still day. It feels like defeat, like it's all over. But it's not—there is something brewing beneath the quiet, deep in the earth. That silence isn't empty; it's heavy with waiting, a pause that tests faith. The disciples hid, unsure, while the tomb held its secret, a king resting before the final move.

Easter Sunday changes everything. The tomb is empty, the stone rolled away and Jesus is alive, victorious. It's not just a neat ending; it's a beginning, a promise of something new. Holy Week isn't some old ritual that we dust off once a year—it's alive, asking us questions. Have we cheered for Him one day and ignored Him the next? Have we served others or ignored the opportunity? Have we carried our struggles or avoided them? And do we see hope in that empty tomb? This week holds up a mirror. It's not about playing a part in some grand show—it's about living as followers of the real, risen Jesus. And it doesn't stop there—because He is alive, Holy Week ripples out. It's in the way we that we forgive, the way we pick up our own crosses, the way we trust that death never gets the last word. It's a reality that we're still living, step by step, day by day, century by century, millennia after millennia.
